Law and Government	Knowledge of laws, legal codes, court procedures, precedents, government regulations, executive orders, agency rules, and the democratic political process.
Public Safety and Security	Knowledge of relevant equipment, policies, procedures, and strategies to promote effective local, state, or national security operations for the protection of people, data, property, and institutions
English Language	Knowledge of the structure and content of the English language including the meaning and spelling of words, rules of composition, and grammar.

Solid writing and spelling skills	Physically fit and enjoys working out
Wear a uniform	Good mental health diagnoses free. Depending on psych exam certain diagnoses will result in student being unemployable (e.g. anger issues, PTSD, depression, personality disorders, bi polar. Certain Mental Health medications may disqualify from employment)
Work as a team member	Visually astute and detail oriented
CANNOT have a police record, BCI criminal background check record	Drug free for last 5 years or more and pass random drug screenings
Certain drugs like heroin, cocaine, ecstasy, etc. are automatic disqualifiers or elimination from the program	Must be able to deal with bodily fluids, smells, injuries, and aggressive/violent individuals

Law Enforcement Work Activities

Identify, pursue, and arrest suspects and perpetrators of criminal acts.	Record facts to prepare reports that document incidents and activities.
Provide for public safety by maintaining order, responding to emergencies, protecting people and property, enforcing motor vehicle and criminal laws, and promoting good community relations.	Monitor, note, report, and investigate suspicious persons and situations, safety hazards, and unusual or illegal activity in patrol area.
Render aid to accident victims and other persons requiring first aid for physical injuries.	Review facts of incidents to determine if criminal act or statute violations were involved.
Testify in court to present evidence or act as witness in traffic and criminal cases.	Relay complaint and emergency-request information to appropriate agency dispatchers.
Process prisoners, and prepare and maintain records of prisoner bookings and prisoner status during booking and pre-trial process.	Monitor traffic to ensure motorists observe traffic regulations and exhibit safe driving procedures.
Photograph or draw diagrams of crime or accident scenes and interview principals and eyewitnesses. Process crime scenes with traumatized victims	Evaluate complaint and emergency-request information to determine response requirements.
Patrol specific area on foot, horseback, or motorized conveyance, responding promptly to calls for assistance.	Investigate traffic accidents and other accidents to determine causes and to determine if a crime has been committed.
Direct traffic flow and reroute traffic in case of emergencies.	Issue citations or warnings to violators of motor vehicle ordinances.
Inform citizens of community services and recommend options to facilitate longer-term problem resolution.	Act as official escorts, such as when leading funeral processions or firefighters.
Respond to medical emergencies by administering basic first aid or by obtaining assistance from paramedics.	Inspect public establishments to ensure compliance with rules and regulations.
Answer alarms and investigate disturbances.	Circulate among visitors, patrons, or employees to preserve order and protect property.
Write reports of daily activities and irregularities, such as equipment or property damage, theft, presence of unauthorized persons, or unusual occurrences.	Monitor and authorize entrance and departure of employees, visitors, and other persons to guard against theft and maintain security of premises.
Patrol industrial or commercial premises to prevent and detect signs of intrusion and ensure security of doors, windows, and gates.	Combat defensive tactic drills-Subject control. De- escalation scenarios for violent/stressful situations
